



THE OBJECTIVES OF FRIENDS OF WAR MEMORIALS

- To monitor the condition of war memorials and to take steps to ensure that local authorities and other relevant organisations are alerted to such condition with a view to their undertaking any necessary restoration, essential maintenance, repairs, renovations and cleaning.
- 2. To liaise with secular and ecclesiastical authorities, regiments and other responsible bodies with a view to their accepting responsibility for, and undertaking repairs to and restoration of, war memorials.
- 3. To publicise and to educate and inform the public about the spiritual, archæological, artistic, aesthetic and historical significance of war memorials as part of our national heritage; to encourage support groups and to inspire young people to cherish their local war memorials and the memory of those who sacrificed their lives in the cause of freedom.

REGIONAL VOLUNTEERS


Regional Volunteers are members who act as FoWM's eyes and ears locally and inform us of war memorials and rolls of honour in their area that need attention. We very much appreciate RV's assistance in a number of tasks. We may let them know of cases that need local knowledge, or they could relay details of war memorial problems and local contacts to us. We also ask RV's to attend re-dedications on our behalf and perhaps to lay a wreath where appropriate. RV's do as much or as little as they are able and, in effect, act as "reservists" to be called upon when needed, as well as being correspondents when they see fit.

Essex

Following information given to Jane Gaskell at the Fenland Country Fair, RV Bob Pike dashed to rescue a beautiful wooden war memorial from an antique market in Suffolk on FoWM's behalf. The antique dealer refused to reduce the asking price or donate the plaque and apparently knew nothing of its provenance. So, FoWM having acquired the memorial for £95, Bob turned detective and, through his research into the names on the memorial established that most of those commemorated (served and died) had connections with the Witton area of Blackburn, Lancashire. But where had the memorial come from? A circular mailing ruled out Anglican, Roman Catholic and Methodist Churches and Conservative Clubs in Blackburn and a report on Radio Lancashire drew a blank. Then Wirral RV Carol Littler put Bob in touch with local historian, Bill Turner of Accrington, who found that the dead men were members of Chapel Street Congregational (United Reformed) Church in Blackburn. The Church was demolished in 1975 leaving only the spire as a landmark but there remains a local URC congregation and FoWM has contacted them to clarify finally the memorial's provenance. We may never know where the memorial has been for the last 26 years or how it came to be for sale in Suffolk but thanks to everyone involved for their detective work so far.



Reflections on a busy year

How time flies! One minute I was meeting Sir Donald Thompson and Joanne Ayers at the 2000 Caravan Show to discuss my new job with FoWM and the next I'm back at Earls Court setting up FoWM's stand for the 2001 Caravan Show. I knew a little about FoWM before I joined the team - that FoWM had progressed from small beginnings to having a full-time Conservation Officer and administering English Heritage's War Memorials grants scheme. I now know a lot more - especially that there is still so much to do.

December 2000 found the Kings Cross-Cambridge rail link still in chaos following the Hatfield rail crash - though the delays gave me valuable on-board reading time to get to grips with all those FoWM files. A year on and WAGN's time-keeping is still a shambles but my pattern is set and I visit FoWM office two days a week. But like the rest of the FoWM team, I'm never "off-duty" - to the point where my mother has been heard to say in a loud voice at social gatherings "Is she talking shop again!" It's encouraging that so many people are interested in war memorials and my work at FoWM.

From May to October, most weekends have been occupied taking the stand to events where supportive organisers have given FoWM free space. I have enjoyed tremendous back-up and loyalty from Regional Volunteers, the old-hands and some who were also new to FoWM - but we all learnt together and got on with spreading the word and answering visitors' queries about war memorials. We've also had to answer a lot of other questions: most

frequently "Where's the nearest loo?" and
"Where can I get a cup of tea?" I'm thinking
that we should ask for a donation in the
collecting box before answering the first, and
filling every available thermos with tea or coffee
to sell from the FoWM stand in response to the
second. Not to mention asking for a donation
from people at events hugging Sally or having
their photo taken with her - from canine volunteer
to FoWM mascot in just 12 months!

One year on and I am finding working with FoWM a worthwhile challenge and I am grateful to all those people who have generously supported us with donations, their time, energy and enthusiasm and in practical ways, sending us paper, jiffy bags, post-it notes and other stationery. (Can anyone guess who sends all their horse race-branded freebie biros for FoWM to put to good use?) But, the thing that still shocks me the most is the number of war memorials FoWM rescues from redundant buildings. The majority of memorials are well cared for, but I am appalled that so many others

still end up languishing in skips, scrapyards, car boot sales and antique markets. Those whose names appear on these memorials can no longer speak up, but FoWM can fight on their behalf to prevent the memorials being discarded or destroyed, and raise funds to ensure that they remain in perpetual care.

War memorials are not just for Remembrance Day but for every day.









Ash, Suffolk, This memorial obelisk is unusual in recording only one man, Pte Joseph Archie Moss of the Durham Light Infantry. Of the 44 Stoke Ash men who served only Pte Moss failed to return, being killed in June 1917 the day after the local paper announced that he had been awarded the Military Medal for bravery.

FUNDING UPDATE

English Heritage and FoWM War Memorial Grant Scheme: Latest Grants

Grants of up to £5,000 per project are available from English Heritage's Grant Scheme for War Memorial Repair and Conservation. To be eligible a war memorial must be Grade II listed in its own right and situated in a Conservation Area in England.

FoWM administers the scheme and information/application packs and advice are available from Maggie Goodall at FoWM.

Grants are awarded quarterly on the recommendation of a Grants Advisory Panel, which is next scheduled to meet on January 9th, 2002. Applicants should note that grant applications cannot be made retrospectively. The latest successful projects are:

Brenchley, Kent

£400 for professional investigative cleaning of this elaborately carved wheel cross to help assess the possible need for relettering and repair.

East Markham, Nottinghamshire

£395 to repoint the memorial and replace missing letters from the Roll of Honour. The memorial takes a classical form widely used

for funerary monuments and war memorials: a broken column, symbolising life ended prematurely. But at East Markham the designer took the unusual step of including the column's severed capital, which is placed on a corner of the memorial's base.

New Heritage Lottery Fund Grant Scheme

The HLF has launched a new grant scheme, Your Heritage, which will award grants between £5,000 and £50,000 to projects that care for, increase understanding of and access to the heritage and benefit the community. 

UK National Inventory of War Memorials Launched

The building of memorials to those killed in WWI has been described as the biggest public art project in history. But no systematic attempt had been made to quantify, classify or record all the country's war memorials from the two World Wars and other conflicts before the National Inventory of War Memorials was begun at the Imperial War Museum in 1989. The UKNIWM now has information about 45 000 of the UK's war memorials catalogued on its database, which was launched on November 8th, 2001 with a celebration at the Museum. Researched by 500 volunteer recorders working with the IWM team of three (Nick Hewitt, Jane Armer and Lorraine Knight, following initial work by Catherine Moriarty) the database will be accessible to the public in the Museum's reading rooms. An archive of survey forms, photographs, postcards and ephemera supports the database and it is hoped to make the information and illustrations available on the Internet in due course. Recording will continue in areas where coverage is not yet complete, for information contact: The UKNIWM at The Imperial War Museum All Saints Annexe, Austral Street, London, SE1 6HZ.

The illustrated War Memorials Handbook by UKNIWM Committee Member Stephen Croad was also launched on November 8th and gives guidance on how to approach the conservation of war memorials and on using the Inventory as an information resource. The book is available from the Imperial War Museum shop at £4.99 and by mail order on 01223 499353 (Reference BK9038, add £1.00 for postage and packing).

In Brief

Addition of a missing name to the Roll of Honour at Balmashanner war memorial, Forfar in Angus was marked by a commemorative service in September. Pte Andrew Graham Lindsay of the 1st Battalion The Black Watch was killed in the Battle of Givenchy on January 25th, 1915 and has no known grave. 

were rededicated on November 4th at the building on Mount Street which, with the help of former pupil Sir Paul McCartney, has now become the Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts. Norwich Roll of Honour, like Norwich's WWI war memorial stone was designed by Sir Edwin Lutvens, and lists the names of some 3,500 Norwich men who died in The Great War. It has been redisplayed as part of the redevelopment of Norwich Castle Museum alongside a new touch-screen database of information about those recorded.

The Roll of Honour on Newton war memorial, Cambridgeshire has been relettered. A handsome stone pylon, which unfortunately has lost the metal weather vane which once crowned it, this memorial retains its water trough (now filled with flowers) dedicated to all the horses killed in WWI. In 2000 FoWM lent its support to a group of local people resisting proposals to remove the war memorial chancel screen from St Alban's Church, Stroud, Gloucestershire. The objectors prevailed; the screen was saved and has now been restored.


WAR MEMORIAL NEWS

Local man Wayne Gerrard has rescued Salem Presbyterian Church war memorial from the obscurity of a store room. It is now on view at Salem Christian Centre, Rhyl. Local school children have raised £45 towards the restoration of Merrow war memorial, Surrey by collecting copper coins.

The South African War Memorial in the Buttermarket, Bury St Edmunds, Suffolk has been restored at at cost of £20,000 and vandal damage to the Newmachar war memorial near Inverurie has been repaired by Aberdeenshire and Newmachar Community Councils. The fight to save the Oxted & Limpsfield War Memorial Hospital, Surrey continues with FoWM supporter and war memorial hospital expert Cdr Josh Cosnett in the forefront of the campaign. But sadly the red brick war memorial wing at Acton Hospital, Gunnersbury Lane, London was demolished in October.

New War Memorials

A two-ton memorial stone dedicated to British. Commonwealth and Allied servicepeople who have died in all conflicts, and set on a plinth containing sand from Dunkirk, cobblestones from Auschwitz and a fragment of the Berlin Wall, was unveiled in October at Mirfield, West Yorkshire. Trafford Council and the local Royal British Legion branch have set up a special blue plaque outside The Grapes pub on Chapel Street, Altrincham, Cheshire to commemorate what King George V called in a 1919 telegram the bravest little street in England, 160 men from this street of 60 terraced houses served in WWI, 29 of them were killed. A new brass plaque mounted on the village sign at Corton, Suffolk commemorates the village's dead of two World Wars. A new sculpture celebrating break-through radar research early in WWII by scientists based in the Isle of Purbeck was unveiled in October by astronomer Sir Bernard Lovell. The striking memorial, on St Aldhelm's Head near Worth Matravers, Dorset stands nine feet high and was designed by local people.



The New US Royal Naval Volunteers Reserve Memorial at Greenwich by Amy Flint

A new memorial plaque to US RNVR volunteers in the Painted Hall at the former Royal Naval College, Greenwich was unveiled on October 3rd. The plaque names the American volunteers who served with the Royal Navy between 1939 and 1941, at the risk of losing their US citizenship for swearing allegiance to a foreign power at a time when the US was still neutral. Following its unveiling by Rear Admiral Tim McClement, Assistant Chief of Naval Staff, the plaque was blessed by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Of the band of US volunteers only David Gibson and Edwin Russell now survive. Mr Russell represented them both at the ceremony, laying a wreath alongside that laid by Mrs Beth Bush on behalf of the deceased volunteers.

In his address to the guests at the commemoration Friends of War Memorials President Winston S Churchill poignantly stated: We meet today to commemorate a number of gallant Americans who, in our hour of need - when the fate of Britain and of the cause of freedom hung in the balance volunteered to serve in the Royal Navy in the period 1939 - 1941, before America's entry into the conflict. Their numbers may not have been great, but the fact that they came, at a moment when Britain stood alone, meant so much. They proved to be the harbingers of the millions that were to come later. No man can do more for a country than to volunteer to fight for it. It is for this fine, disinterested action that, belatedly, we thank them today.


SELECTED APPEALS

Here we are able to feature a small selection of the appeals that we receive.

The Thiepval Project - Update
Sir Frank Sanderson, Chairman of the project
to create an education centre near Sir Edwin
Lutyens' memorial to the 72,000 missing of the
Battle of the Somme, has written to let us
know that £295,000 has been raised to date.

design the centre will be announced soon.

The Royal Naval Division Memorial

This memorial commemorates 45,000 casualties sustained by the RND in WWI. The Division was disbanded in 1919 after distinguishing itself in frontline engagements at Gallipoli and on the Western Front, and survivors commissioned the elegant fountain memorial from Sir Edwin Lutyens. It stood adjacent to the Old Admiralty Building on Horse Guards from 1925 when it was unveiled until 1939 when it was dismantled to protect it during the construction of the Citadel. The memorial was re-erected at Greenwich College in 1951 but now that the College is no longer a Naval establishment, the Committee to Reinstate the RND Memorial believes it should be returned to Horse Guards, where its original base survives. The Committee has launched an appeal for funds for the relocation work (Registered Charity No 262717).
