

## THE OBJECTIVES OF FRIENDS OF WAR MEMORIALS

3. To publicise and to educate and inform the public about the spiritual, archæological, artistic, aesthetic and historical significance of war memorials as part of our national heritage; to encourage support groups and to inspire young people to cherish their local war memorials and the memory of those who sacrificed their lives in the cause of freedom.


#### REGIONAL VOLUNTEERS

Regional Volunteers are members who act as FoWM's eyes and ears locally and inform us of war memorials and rolls of honour in their area that need attention. We very much appreciate RV's assistance in a number of tasks. We may let them know of cases that need local knowledge, or they could relay details of war memorial problems and local contacts to us. We also ask RV's to attend re-dedications on our behalf and perhaps to lay a wreath where appropriate. RV's do as much or as little as they are able and, in effect, act as "reservists" to be called upon when needed, as well as being correspondents when they see fit.


#### Wiltshire

#### The 2002 Flora London Marathon

Six energetic Friends of War Memorials supporters from diverse backgrounds are running this year's London Marathon to raise funds for FoWM's work with war memorials.

Sara Doughty, originally from Lancashire but now London-based, works in the pharmaceutical industry and though she has been running for about 10 years ran her first marathon only last year. Crossing the finish line she immediately decided, despite the aches and blisters, that she wanted to do it again - faster!

John Wrathmell is originally from Yorkshire and gained his interest in historic monuments from his parents, an archæologist and an historic buildings expert. After leaving the Navy a year ago Chris set up a retail business in Clitheroe, Lancashire with his partner Cheryl Morris, selling outdoor clothing and climbing equipment. Cheryl grew up in Helensburgh, Scotland where her father was based as Warrant Officer submariner. After taking a degree in Physical Education, she taught sport for Dunbartonshire Council and later spent five years with the Lancashire Constabulary, serving at Accrington and Great Harwood.

Lt Nick Holmes is currently serving with the 1st Battalion The King's Own Scottish Borderers and L/Cpl Mark Corbet with the 1st Battalion The Royal Irish Regiment.

FoWM is very grateful to John Spurling of the Flora London Marathon Committee who secured our six places and to our six runners for undertaking the 26 mile challenge on its behalf. #### **FoWM Maritime News**

FoWM Maritime is delighted to report after four years' hard campaigning that the Under Secretary of State for Defence, Dr Lewis Moonie, has announced greater protection for wrecked military vessels and maritime war graves through application of the 1986 Protection of Military Remains Act. Vessels that meet specific criteria will henceforth be designated as Controlled Sites where diving without a licence will be prohibited, or as Protected Places where diving will be permitted only on a "look but don't touch" basis. Following initial designation of 16 wrecks under UK jurisdiction as Controlled Sites and five in international waters as Protected Places, the MOD will carry out rolling assessment of all other known British military wrecks. The intention is that all such vessels on which lives are known to have been lost will eventually be safeguarded. Though the PMRA had existed for 15 years its provisions had never before been invoked so Dr Moonie's announcement is an important step in making disturbance of and removal of items from such wrecks illegal.

#### FoWM and The Experience Corps

The Experience Corps is a new Home Office initiative to encourage people in the 50+ age group to volunteer and so share their skills and experience for the benefit of their community, and to identify and match suitable opportunities to volunteers. The project was launched on January 30th by the Corps' Chair, Baroness Sally Greengross OBE and the Home Secretary the Rt Hon David Blunkett MP. Opportunities in England will be co-ordinated by Experience Corps regional animators and it is hoped that volunteers will be able to assist with practical work to improve the condition of war memorials and their settings, such as horticulture, hard-landscaping, maintenance and research. Friends of War Memorials is helping the Corps to identify suitable sites so if readers know of war memorials in their area that would benefit from the scheme, please contact Maggie Goodall at FoWM with details. #### The Memorial Tree by Sgt Walter Scott RAF (WOP/AG No 630 Sqd)

"No trespassers" the sign proclaims, As I pass by it, from the lane, Through long grass, rippled by the breeze, Forward to the brooding trees.

Footsteps muffled by thick leaf mould, Like skeleton hands, the low twigs hold, They catch my sleeves, as if in fear, That I shall find their secret here.

Now suddenly, a clearing, split When a dying, plunging, aircraft hit. A brass plate, fastened to a tree, On it seven names stare out at me.

I press my fingers to the plate, Thinking back to that night of fate, That night of flame, and naked fear, When a stricken bomber crashed right here.

Now, as I leave this place of death, The clearing seems to hold its breath. On looking back, did I really see Seven figures there, by the great old tree?

Back in the lane, back in the sun, Back from the time, when I was young, I have just seen what I came to see, A brass plate on an old, old tree.

## Friends of War Memorials Grants

#### Quinquennial Review of FoWM Grants

2002 is an important year for Friends of War Memorials. Not only does it mark the centenary of the end of the South African wars (1899 - 1902) which gave rise to many significant war memorials; but it is also FoWM's 5th Anniversary, FoWM having been registered as a charity in 1997. It therefore seemed a good idea to start the year by taking stock of FoWM's grant-making and related activities and quantifying how many war memorials the organisation has assisted financially (directly or indirectly) to date. Between 1998 and the end of 2001, FoWM awarded grants totalling £18,787 to 115 projects via its Small Grants Scheme, funded courtesy of The Halifax plc. In addition, FoWM made direct grants of £1,725 to 8 projects from its own resources in 2001. Since 1998 FoWM has also channelled £37,285.60 in indirect grants to 11 projects - for example £2,000 was given towards relocation of a memorial at Aleppo, Syria, which commemorates the last engagement of WWI in the Middle East, to remove it from the path of a new motorway. This makes an impressive five year total of £57,797 in grants to 144 war memorial projects of all types: repair, restoration, conservation and the creation of new memorials.

FoWM's recent casework figures (420 new cases and 240 general enquiries in 2000, 368 new cases and 387 general enquiries in 2001) and the steady demand for grant aid seem to indicate not only that FoWM's work to raise awareness of the significance of and need to care for war memorials is bearing fruit via a greater willingness to tackle war memorial problems, but also that FoWM is increasingly the body to which people turn for advice and assistance.








#### **FUNDING UPDATE**

English Heritage and FoWM War Memorial Grant Scheme:

Since it began in 2000, English Heritage's Grant Scheme for War Memorial Repair and Conservation has awarded £53,767 in grants to 22 projects in England, with further grants forthcoming. English Heritage has now extended the scheme for a further two years (April 2002 to March 2004) and has issued a revised information leaflet to coincide with the relaunch of the grant scheme. It is available both from English Heritage regional offices and from FoWM. The leaflet shows Fenton war memorial, Stoke on Trent, one of the first memorials to receive a grant from the scheme (£5,000 towards replacement of the soldier firgure's hands and rifle which had been irreparably smashed by vandals) and another successful project, Barrow on Humber war memorial, East Yorkshire.

#### New Heritage Lottery Fund Grant Scheme

The HLF has launched a new grant scheme. Your Heritage, which will award grants between £5,000 and £50,000 to projects that care for. increase understanding of and access to the heritage and benefit the community. Awards of 50% of eligible project costs up to a maximum grant of £5,000 are available from the scheme which is administered on English Heritage's behalf by Friends of War Memorials. To be eligible a war memorial must be Grade II listed in its own right and situated in a Conservation Area in England. Grants are awarded quarterly on the recommendation of a Grants Advisory Panel. Potential applicants can obtain information, application forms and advice from Maggie Goodall at FoWM and should note that applications cannot be made retrospectively. The latest successful projects are:

Buckinghamshire £2.035 for repair and conservation of the elaborately decorated war memorial cross in St Peter's churchyard. The cross was designed by William Henry Ward of Bedford Square, London who was articled to architect Sir Reginald Blomfield and who worked as a draughtsman for Sir Edwin Lutyens






#### Firemen Remembered

Some 400 firemen and women died in London alone during WWII. Familiar figures on the Home Front, fire-fighters' wartime experience was as unique and particular as that of other groups involved in the country's defence. They died in places Londoners pass every day - in buildings such as schools, churches and factories and in streets where their fire appliances were hit in raids as they worked. A plaque at Old Palace School, Beckenham commemorates the 13 London and 21 Beckenham firemen and women killed on the night of April 19th, 1941 when a bomb destroyed the school building being used as a sub-firestation - the largest single loss of Fire Brigade personnel in England.

Readers may be familiar with the Blitz Memorial at St Paul's (designed by John Mills in 1991) but less so with the work of *Firemen Remembered*, an organisation set up in 2000 by Fire Brigade historians, veteran wartime fire-fighters and relatives of those killed, to



create memorials at sites where members of the Fire Service lost their lives between 1939 and 1945. The group is currently seeking charitable status and in addition to creation of commemorative

plaques is establishing an archive and educational resources.

#### The Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve Roll of Honour

The 50th Anniversary of the end of WWII in 1995 highlighted the fact that there was no comprehensive list of RNVR members killed between 1939 and 1945. The RNVR Officers' Association HQ building at 38 Hill Street, London, W1 was dedicated as a memorial in 1954 and it was decided to compile a Roll of Honour to be displayed there recording all those volunteers from the Empire and Commonwealth who had given their lives. Naval Volunteer Reserves are commemorated on CWGC-maintained memorials from Chatham in Kent to Halifax, Nova Scotia and Devonport, Auckland and there are RNVR graves in 523 CWGC plots in Britain alone. Now the names of all 6,200 RNVR officers and ratings have been drawn



#### Memorials by Artists and The Memorial Arts Charity

Memorials by Artists is a nationwide service which helps individuals and groups to commission high quality memorials of all types for churchyards, cemeteries, commemorative gardens and other public spaces. It was founded by Harriet Frazer in 1988 after the death of her stepdaughter and has overseen the creation of hundreds of memorials in Britain and overseas. Each of these memorials is unique - designed by one of almost a hundred independent artists/makers responding to a specific commission.

Memorials by Artists also runs *The Memorial Arts Charity* which works to promote and organise training in skills such as letter cutting which are associated with memorial-making. The charity also contributes to debate on the meaning of memorials and is planning a long-term exhibition of work on memorial themes in collaboration with the National Trust, following the

success of its temporary exhibition at the Trust's Blickling Hall, Norfolk in 1998.

## WAR MEMORIAL NEWS

In Brief - War Memorials Restored Bishop's Stortford war memorial. Hertfordshire has been cleaned, and the 391st Bombardment Group USSAF memorial at Matching Green, Essex has been rebuilt after being damaged in a road traffic accident. Highley war memorial, Shropshire has been cleaned, repaired and a missing name (Pte William Gibbs of the Machine Gun Corps who died in 1917) added to is Roll of Honour. A WWI plague originally from Up Holland Grammar School, Lancashire has been refurbished and rededicated at St Thomas the Martyr Church, Up Holland. The Railways Heritage Trust has grant-aided stone and metal conservation and repairs to the London and South West Railway war memorial arch at Waterloo Station. Tamworth war memorial hall, Staffordshire (formerly the waiting room for Tamworth General Hospital) has been reopened after refurbishment. Children from Old Warren School, Lowestoft, Suffolk cleaned the town's Royal Naval Patrol Service memorial after vandals pelted it with eggs just before Remembrance Day. A WWI plaque from the former St Ninian's Church, Bechin in Angus which had been in storage since 1963, has been returned to public view at the Gardner Memorial Church, Brechin.

A WWI war memorial in the Pine Woods at Valley Gardens, Harrogate formerly obscured by overgrown shrubbery is now clearly visible to passers-by again after the site was cleared by cadets from the Army Foundation College at Pennypot. The memorial records the names of local service people who died as a result of injuries rather than being killed in action. Damage caused to the Battle of the Standards memorial at Northallerton in Yorkshire when thieves stole its bronze shield and metal plaque in November 2001 is to be repaired. The stone obelisk marks the battlefield where King David of Scotland's army, invading England following the death of King Henry I, was defeated in 1138 by forces raised by Thurstan, Archbishop of York.

#### **New War Memorials**

A new memorial wall has been built to supplement the existing Norwegian memorial at North Weald Airfield. A memorial stone has been unveiled at Reedham in Norfolk to commemorate the crews of two 385th Bomb Group USSAF B-17's who died in a mid air collision there in February 1944. The site was investigated by archæologists from Channel 4's Time Team for a programme about the crash and the American airbase at Mildenhall arranged for an honour guard when the memorial was dedicated (see page 5 for picture). Secretary of the Bargoed branch of the Royal British Legion (Mid Glamorgan) Ray Thompson, has presented the town's library with three books commemorating the area's war dead.

Sergeant Kenneth Walter Bramble, a pilot with 609 Sqdn, The Royal Airforce Volunteer Reserve, killed in July 1941 and buried in Merville Cemetery in northern France, has been remembered on a new memorial in Fromelles, close to where his Spitfire crashed. The memorial was organised by a local historian, Joss Leclercq, who has been trying to trace Sgt Bramble's relatives - so far without success. 

The site of the Esquelbecq Massacre (northern France) in which 70 British Soldiers were killed on May 28th, 1940 has been acquired by L'association La Plaine au bois, which has reconstructed the barn in which the massacre took place from photographic evidence to stand as a memorial. A memorial service was held there in November 2001 and the association is commissioning interpretation panels, which explain the site's significance to visitors.

#### War Memorials Vandalised

FoWM is sad to report that the West End war memorial in **South Shields** has been so badly vandalised that it is having to be replaced by a completely new memorial; and that the Christ figure at the **Heroes' Shrine**, **Aldershot**, designed by FoWM Vice President, sculptor Josefina de Vasconcellos, has been vandalised.

#### British Air Services Memorial, St Omer

St Omer airfield lies just 21 miles south of Calais and was the home of the Royal Flying Corps on the Western Front from October 1914. At the formation of the Royal Air Force in April 1918 over 4,000 personnel were based there and though the airfield still exists there is no evidence that it was once the largest operational station on the Western Front.

An appeal fund has therefore been set up to raise £20,000 to build a new memorial at St Omer to commemorate all members of the British Air Services who served on the Western Front in WWI.
