#### **ROBERT BURNS 1895-2000**

Robert Burns, veteran of the 7th Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, sadly died in November just two weeks before his 105th birthday. Robert was one of only 75 from his Battalion to survive the Battle of the Somme in 1916, and was a familiar figure to FoWM members through his annual attendance at FoWM's Somme Day ceremony and other events. His funeral with full military honours on November 10th was accompanied by pipers from his Regiment and, appropriately, a BBC Timewatch programme including Robert's memories of seeing armoured tanks first appear in battle in 1916, was screened on November 11th.

FoWM's £1000 Donation to the Royal Marines National Memorial

left: Lord Cope of Berkeley presents the cheque to Major General John Hardy Through the generosity of one of our members, Friends of War Memorials has been able to donate £1000 to the Royal Marines National Memorial Appeal, to raise £75,000 to repair and enhance their memorial on The Mall.

Originally constructed in 1903 to commemorate Royal Marine casualties in China (1900) and South Africa (1899-1902) and designed by Sir Thomas Graham Jackson, with poignant sculpture by Captain Adrian Jones of a Marine defending his fallen comrade, the memorial is listed Grade II in recognition of its architectural importance. In addition to the repair work, the memorial has now been encircled by a bronze collar inscribed with a dedication to all the Royal Marines who fell in other conflicts from WWI onwards - making this the Marines' national memorial.

FoWM Trustee Lord Cope of Berkeley presented the cheque for £1000 to Major General John Hardy CB LVO, the Appeal Fund Coordinator, at the memorial on October 25th. The refurbished memorial was rededicated by the Chaplain of the Fleet on October 29th at a service in the presence of HRH Prince Philip (Captain General of the Royal Marines).

### **English Heritage and** FoWM War Memorial Grant Scheme - First Grants Announced

English Heritage's £200,000 grant scheme for repair and conservation of war memorials started in April this year. Grants are awarded quarterly on the advice of a Grants Advisory Panel and the first of what we hope will be many successful projects were announced in November. They were:

#### Hertford War Memorial, Herts.

£5000 to conserve and repair the impressive stone cenotaph and life-size bronze sculpted hart. This superb memorial by architect Sir Aston Webb and sculptor Alfred Drury is unusual in having an animal sculpture (here the Hertfordshire county symbol) as its principal figure.



Readers will remember from our Summer 2000 Newsletter the sad story of vandals smashing the soldier figure's hands and Lee Enfield Rifle at this memorial. A grant of £2940 has been made towards the cost of sculpting new hands and reconstructing the rifle based on an actual example by sculptor Simon Smith.



Washingborough Memorial Cross, Lincs. £600 to repair the stone base of the cross, damaged by vehicular impact.

Funds are still available for this financial year and the grant scheme will continue through 2001/02. There are also still many damaged and decayed memorials in need of assistance. English Heritage's Chairman Sir Neil Cossons and FoWM's President Winston S Churchill joined together to encourage communities with eligible memorials to apply. To be eligible a war memorial must be independently listed Grade II and situated in a Conservation Area in England. FoWM is administering the grant scheme and information, application packs and advice are available from Maggie Goodall at FoWM, as is an advice sheet on How to Get a War Memorial Listed



## Friends of War Memorials Grants

Friends of War Memorials gives small grants (courtesy of the Halifax plc) contributing to war memorial projects nation-wide and overseas. There are no geographical restrictions or listing requirements and the grants have assisted a diverse cross-section of both existing and new war memorials. Recently completed projects include:

The creation of a new memorial in Surrey to commemorate **RAF Kenley** and its importance to air defences in both WWI and WWII, especially during the Battle of Britain.

The Portland stone memorial is by Rowland Bros of Croydon to a design by Kenley Tribute Committee Treasurer Fred Webb and takes the form of an open book with RAF crest and figures representing Kenley personnel – ground staff, air crews and WRAF. The memorial was dedicated at a gala day in August, which included an aerial display by the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight.



The restoration of Little Cornard War Memorial, Suffolk where sufficient funds were also raised to fund the memorial's upkeep for the



next 10 years. Regional Volunteer Dr M Charlton attended the rededication on FoWM's behalf.

Restoration of the memorial at **Burton on**Trent, Staffs. Originally unveiled in 1922, this splendid memorial by Charles Henry Fehr had suffered from severe weathering and a lack of regular attention, which led to its deterioration and the 9½ foot tall winged Victory figure becoming unstable. After conservation of Victory (supported by a specially constructed cradle during the work) and repair to the stone plinth and supporting figures of Peace and St George, the memorial has been reassembled and its future assured.

Refurbishment and renewal of the decayed name plaques on the memorial at **Barnack, Cambs.** A Scimitar tank and the town band led a procession to the rededication service, which closed with a flypast by vintage planes and modern jetfighters.

## FUNDING **UPDATE**

## THE COUNTRYSIDE AGENCY'S LOCAL HERITAGE INITIATIVE

The Local Heritage Initiative has awarded more an enhanced awareness and understanding among than £1m in grants to 99 projects over the last 9 about the type of projects that they would like to get off the ground and to submit a suitable application for funding.

LHI projects involve local people actively working to investigate, explain and care for an aspect, or aspects, of local heritage important to them. This may be archaeological, natural, built or industrial heritage, or local customs and traditions. The LHI is particularly suitable for groups who wish to investigate a range of local heritage features or types; indeed many groups find that the subject of their particular investigation can only be properly understood when placed in the context of the local landscape and other features of the exhibition or leaflet about those named on the surrounding area.



War Memorials are common heritage features in many towns and villages, and are eligible for LHI funding. However, the

LHI is not intended to support maintenance or oneoff repair projects. Physical restoration can only be part of a grant application if there is a clear wider objective of promoting, interpreting and recording the heritage value of the area or feature.

So, what type of war memorial project would be likely to meet the core criteria for LHI funding? Firstly, it would have to actively involve as many people as possible from the community. Secondly, the project should focus on "finding out" about and raising awareness of the importance of the memorial. Last but not least, the project must have public benefits, for example,

local people, especially the young, of what the months. We are still encouraging people to think memorial stands for. Other benefits could include written records, filmed reports or skills-training in renovation work.

> A successful LHI war memorial project might involve schools, history societies, the Royal British Legion, and interested individuals, with as many young people as possible taking part. Other projects have shown that most young people like playing detective in order to find out about their local heritage.

> Investigation work could include interviews with veterans of conflicts, visits to museums and battlefields/cemeteries to research the history.

> Interpretation could include a school memorial, to increase knowledge and understanding of the impact war had on the community. In association with this sort of work, a mason or conservator could be commissioned to share skills and equip local people to participate in future renovation work.

> Any group can apply for an LHI grant, with the exception of commercial organisations or individuals. Grants of between £3,000 and £15,000 can cover up to 95% of eligible costs, although the applicants must contribute a minimum amount of cash, voluntary help or gifts in kind.

#### War Memorials Restored and Saved by Local Initiatives

Friends of War Memorials receives many letters about and photographs of war memorials restored or saved from destruction by determined local people. Here is just a small selection of recent success stories.

#### Restored

At Fritwell, Oxfordshire the Parish Church Council has repaired the 1922 lychgate at St Olave's Church and renewed its badly weathered stone memorial plaque so the names of the fallen of WWI can be read again. The unusual wayside memorial at



Worfield, Shrops. has been refurbished through local efforts, and a wooden cross missing from the memorial outside St Paul's Church, Hounslow, Middx. has been replaced with a new one. A local

(whose Falklands War memorial sculpture *The Yomper* at the Royal Marines Museum, Portsmouth may be familiar to readers) has sculpted a new St George figure to replace that stolen from **Linch War Memorial**, **Hants**. The original was by Bertram Charles Glossop Shore (+ 1967) architect and an adviser to the Imperial (now Commonwealth) War Graves Commission.

#### Saved

When Radmore Green school in Cheshire was demolished some years ago local man, Mr Rogers, rescued its marble war memorial from a skip. Now, thanks to local benefactor Mr Posset, it has been redisplayed on the green

at **Haughton Moss**. The memorial records all the school's Old Boys who served as well as those who were killed.

In 1919 a clock was installed at the racing stables in Beverley, East Yorkshire, to commemorate men of the Beverley-based East Yorkshire Regiment who fell in the Battle of the Marne. The clock's future was placed in doubt by the redevelopment of the stables site, but it has been rescued by members of the Beverley and East Riding Golf Club who have re-installed the clock on the mill tower which forms part of their clubhouse.

A Forgotten Hero Honoured in Canterbury

In April this year FoWM got a call from Chelsea Pensioner Sergeant Tom Isted about his relative Private Cecil Goldfarb of the 7th Battalion East Kent Regiment (The Buffs), who had been killed just weeks before the end of WWI and is buried at Doingt Cemetery on the Somme.

Though Pte Goldfarb (originally from Warsaw) lived in Canterbury, and had won the Military Medal for his service with The Buffs, his name had somehow been omitted from Canterbury war memorial. FoWM put Sqt Isted in touch with Nick Karslake of Canterbury City Council who immediately arranged for Pte Goldfarb's name to be added to the memorial and for a special service to be held in his memory, 82 years to the day that he was killed at Peronne.

The accidental ommision of names from war memorials is a common problem and there are many people anxious to correct mistakes before it is too late. Much depends on the attitude of the local authorities responsible for war memorials and FoWM was delighted by Canterbury City Council's ready response to Sgt Isted's request to have Pte Goldfarb's name included on the Buttermarket memorial.

#### New War Memorials Unveiled

This Millennium year has seen the creation of many new memorials, to commemorate specific groups of people, actions or events; and to permanently record the wartime significance of certain sites here and abroad, particularly where they are to be decommissioned or redeveloped or their memory may fade. One such is "The Worcesters' Layby" in Northern France where a new rough-hewn memorial stone quarried from the Malvern Hills has been set up by the side of the old Vernon to Gisors road. It commemorates those of the 1st Battalion The Worcester Regiment who died in the 10 hour battle against emeny tanks to establish and defend a bridgehead following the crossing of the Seine on August 27th, 1944.

Architectural competitions have been held



to decide the form the Commonwealth Soldiers' Memorial on Constitution Hill and the Animals in War Memorial will take, and for two significant new national memorials unveiled in London this year: toTank Crews and the Fleet Air Arm (both sited near the MOD). The Tank Crews Memorial, sculpted by Vivien Mallock from a design by the late G H Paulin, portrays the crew of a WWII Comet tank and is dedicated to all "tankmen" who have served since tanks were first used in combat at Flers in 1916: "From mud, through blood, to the green fields beyond". The equally impressive Fleet Air Arm Memorial commemorates the 6000 who died in service of the Fleet Air Arm and its precursor the Royal Navy Air Service. Designed by architect



Tim Kempster and sculptor James Butler, the memorial features a figure of Daedalus who, in Greek myth, with his son Icarus escaped King Minos's Crete on wings of wax and feathers, and who has a special significance for the FAA and navy with 5 ships named after him since the C18.





## SELECTED APPEALS

Friends of War Memorials is often approached to help in publicising projects to rescue or restore existing memorials or to create new ones, to assist with research about memorials and those they commemorate, and to make war memorials more accessible to the general public. Here we are able to feature a small selection of the appeals that we receive.

The Thiepval Project

At present there is nothing at Thiepval on the Somme to tell visitors, especially the increasing number of school parties, what happened there in 1916; nothing to set Sir Edwin Lutyens' remarkable 44 metre high Memorial to the Missing, with its 72,085 names, in context. The Thiepval Project intends not to compete with Lutyens' tribute on this most revered and prominent of sites, but to provide a visitor centre (Centre d'acceuil), out of sight of the memorial, to offer information about Thiepval and what it represents, to encourage deeper understanding of the events that led to its creation, to provide a place for quiet reflection, education facilities and other visitor services. An architectural competition is to be held to decide the centre's design.

The British Government has contributed to the project and the Departement of the Somme has offered £300,000 which the appeal in England hopes to match. Registered Charity Number

#### YMCA Memorial at Hopton Barracks, Devizes, Wilts.

In 1999 The Wiltshire Historical Military Society discovered a memorial stone on an industrial estate in Devizes which, from 1939 to the early 1980's, was Hopton Army Barracks. The four-sided memorial stands near the site of the YMCA building and features 1) the YMCA badge and dates 1939-45, 2) the branch of a tree, 3) five stars in a shield, and 4) a dedication "To those of many lands who passed this way to battle for right and returned not". The top of the memorial has 4 small blocks that appear to have been the support for a further element, now missing. The WHMS is trying to find out about the memorial's creation, original design and what the stars in the shield signify, with a view to its restoration. #### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS NO.1 Why does my local war memorial have the dates 1914-1919 when WWI ended in 1918?

The majority of war memorials have the dates 1914-1918 to record that fighting in the First World War was ended by the Armistice, signed at 11am on November 11<sup>th</sup>, 1918 at Compiegne. However, some memorials have 1919 because, although fighting had ceased, the Peace Treaty with Germany was not signed until June 28<sup>th</sup>, 1919 at Versailles. Peace Day in Britain was held on July 19<sup>th</sup>, 1919, but the Versailles Treaty was followed by further treaties throughout 1919 and 1920, such as the Trianon Treaty signed with the newly created Republic of Hungary in June 1920. So, very occasionally, you may also see the dates 1914-1920 on WWI memorials.
