

THE OBJECTIVES OF FRIENDS OF WAR MEMORIALS

- 1. To monitor the condition of war memorials and to take steps to ensure that local authorities and other relevant organisations are alerted to such condition with a view to their undertaking any necessary restoration, essential maintenance, repairs, renovations and cleaning.
- To liaise with ecclesiastical authorities, regiments and other responsible bodies with a view to their accepting responsibility for, and undertaking repairs to and restoration of, war memorials.
- 3. To publicise and to educate and inform the public about the spiritual, archaeological, artistic, aesthetic and historical significance of war memorials as part of our national heritage; to encourage support groups and to inspire young people to cherish their local war memorials and the memory of those who sacrificed their lives in the cause of freedom.

REGIONAL VOLUNTEERS

Regional Volunteers act as FoWM's eyes and ears locally and inform us of war memorials and rolls of honour in their area that need attention.

We very much appreciate RV's assistance in a number of tasks.

We may let them know of any problems that need local knowledge,
or they could relay details of war memorial problems and local contacts to us.

We also ask RV's to attend re-dedications on our behalf and perhaps to lay a
wreath where appropriate. RV's do as much or as little as they are able and, in
effect, act as "reservists"

to be called upon when needed, as well as being correspondents when they see fit.



Northumberland Regional Volunteers



In the last year Friends of War Memorials has assisted in various ways with over 400 war memorials all over the UK. In addition, we have helped remember British troops at Albuhera in Spain and in the Ukraine (where it seems, unfortunately, that the memorial is still neglected). You have helped us to also contribute to a memorial to the Darkdale disaster in St Helena, and Alistair Cowan of Bath has recently submitted a very thorough first-hand study of South African War Memorials. This is exactly the kind of progress we were all hoping for.

We are now pushing on with our schools initiative, FoWM being the only charity or organisation exclusively dedicated to protecting our war memorial national heritage. It is right that we draw younger people towards an awareness of its significance, for Britain and the former Commonwealth, especially since the First World War is now, quite rightly, part of the National Curriculum.

Congratulations Sir Spike!

Everyone at Friends of War Memorials was delighted to hear that FoWM Vice-President, Spike Milligan, had received an honorary Knighthood in the New Year Honours List.

The veteran comedian was born Terence Milligan in India in 1918, the son of an army Warrant Officer. Called-up during WWII he served with the Royal Artillery in Tunisia and Italy, where he acquired the nickname "Spike" and met fellow gunner Harry Secombe. The two worked together as comedians in the Combined Services Entertainment Unit and after the war, with other ex-servicemen Peter Sellers and Michael Bentine, launched the ground-breaking radio comedy series The Goon Show.

Spike is also an acclaimed author: his nonsense verse Ning Nang Nong was voted the nation's favourite comic poem in 1999 and his wartime memoirs Adolf Hitler: My Part in His Downfall and Where Have All The Bullets Gone? have struck a chord with readers of all ages.

At 82, Spike remains a fervent environmental campaigner and FoWM is privileged to have his support. Of his Knighthood

(honorary as he is an Irish citizen) his wife Shelagh says "He is deeply pleased to have been recognised for all the work he has done...He likes a pat on the back like the rest of us."

FoWM Maritime News

In 1997, soon after leaving the Army where I served as a Chaplain and learned to dive, I dived my first war grave, a hospital ship sunk off Dover in WWI with the loss of 127 lives. I was horrified to find that she had been stripped of all

her portholes and that divers had been doing this to war graves for vears.

A law (the Protection of Military Remains Act) had been passed in 1986 allowing the government to designate such wrecks as war graves. This should make such unauthorised salvage and diving illegal, but the MOD has recently admitted that it has vet to so designate any site. Incredibly, removing anything

from a war grave is therefore not illegal so long as the item is declared to the Receiver of Wreck.

Sir Donald Thompson supported me in setting up a maritime bureau, Friends of War Memorials - Maritime, with a fellow diver and FoWM member, Jill Jokel.

We have been campaigning for the proper legal protection of war graves for 2 years now, with great success. There has been coverage in the national press and on the Radio 4 PM programme, a debate and early day motions in the Commons and questions asked in the Commons and the Lords.

The government has finally agreed to review the situation, producing a discussion document and asking for our response - with concerned survivors and ex-service organisations also looking to FoWM - Maritime for advice in making theirs.

During all this, we have been consulting with sports diver agencies and preparing our stand for the Dive Show, which took place in London in March. We produced 5,000 leaflets for distribution at the Show and hope that you will enjoy reading the one enclosed here. Do also visit our website at www.fowmmaritime.co.uk for an update.

Rest assured, having exposed this national scandal, we will do all we can to see that these underwater memorials to those who gave their lives for our freedom are legally protected and receive the respect they deserve.

World War II Airfields in Suffolk

Over 30 airfields were built in Suffolk during World War II. At any one time, there were 3000 personnel stationed at each airfield. Many of these personnel are now being remembered by new memorials, which are being installed near to the old airfields.

FLYERS

There is a diverse range of designs, from stone tails of B17 bombers to village signs. Most of the memorials have been designed and paid for by American veterans though this led to difficulties in the design of the 491st Bomb Group memorial at Metfield Airfield as American bricks are not the same size as English bricks!

Many local aviation museums are dedicated to the bomb groups that were based on these Suffolk airfields during WWII. They are well worth visiting to discover the airmen's eyewitness accounts.

Friends of War Memorials Grants

Friends of War Memorials gives small grants (courtesy of the Halifax plc) contributing to war memorial projects nation-wide and overseas. There are no geographical restrictions or listing requirements and the grants have assisted a diverse cross-section of both existing and new war memorials. Recently completed projects include:

Refurbishment of Craven Arms War Memorial, situated in Stokesay Churchyard, Shropshire. This unusual WWI memorial by Storr Barber of Leominster has the soldier figure supported by a stylised, almost abstract, dolphin and, being constructed of local red sandstone, required careful professional treatment.

Construction of a new memorial at **Dun in Angus** to commemorate the fallen of WWI. The memorial was unveiled on Remembrance Day last year and features the work of Brechin stonemason Tom Church and Aberdeen engraver lan Hadden. Restoration of the

The dismantling and rebuilding of the 60 stone pieces which make up the memorial was carried out by Groundwork's West Cumbria team, and local schoolchildren collected things for a time capsule placed inside the memorial.

FUNDING UPDATE

English Heritage and FoWM War Memorial Grant Scheme: Latest Grants

English Heritage's £200,000 grant scheme for the repair and conservation of war memorials started last year. Grants are awarded quarterly on the advice of a Grants Advisory Panel and the latest successful projects are:

Newark War Memorial, Nottinghamshire £3,515 to conserve and repair the cross and surrounding hard landscaping.

This memorial is a fine example of Sir Reginald Blomfield's WWI Cross of Sacrifice, originally designed to stand alongside Sir Edwin Lutyens' Stone of Remembrance in Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemeteries. and much reproduced and copied at home.

The Newark Cross of Sacrifice was originally designed for Calne, Wilts. but was adopted by Newark and made for the grounds of St Mary's Church by Jenkin & Son of Torquay.

Rolvenden War Memorial, Kent

£350 as the first instalment in a 2-phase project to repair the memorial. Phase 1 of the project was to remove the accumulated grime on the memorial's base which obscured the quality of its stonework, to allow assessment of its current state. Phase 2 will be to carry out the stone consolidation and repairs necessary to return the memorial to a sound condition. This important WWI war memorial is the work of Sir Edwin Lutyens, and its design is typical of his subtle mastery of materials and geometry.

NAIOMI The National Index of Memorial Inscriptions

This project, to complete the recording of all memorial inscriptions including those on war memorials (already begun by the network of local Family History Societies) and to make this information available via database and internet, is currently awaiting the outcome of a funding application to the Heritage Lottery Fund. NAIOMI will be based at De Montford University's Bedford campus and will record and preserve the valuable genealogical and social information available from memorial inscriptions.

The Trust exists to connect builders, architects. landscape designers and clients with sculptors and their work. It holds a database of over 600 artists in Scotland and can provide contacts. assistance and support. It also publishes a quarterly magazine Sculpture Matters.

Funds are still available and the grant scheme will continue through 2001/02. To be eligible a war memorial must be independently listed at Grade II and situated in a Conservation Area in England. FoWM is administering the grant scheme and information, application packs and advice are available from Maggie Goodall at FoWM. Supplementary advice for applicants is being prepared and will be available soon.

WAR MEMORIAL NEWS

New War Memorials

A new memorial to honour North Tyneside servicepeople who have died in conflicts since 1945 was unveiled at Killingworth in November. The memorial's design - a 10ft tall jigsaw with pieces missing - by sculptor Judith Spreadbury, symbolises family and friends left behind mourning the loss of loved ones. It was made by welders at Swan Hunter's Tyneside shipyard and sponsored by Morrison's supermarket chain.



A memorial stone brought to Aldershot from the Falkland Islands to commemorate members of 5th Infantry Brigade Signal Squadron who died there in the 1982 campaign has been relocated and rededicated at Caythorpe, Lincolnshire following the formation of 16th Air Assault Brigade.

Western Isles Council has approved grants to the North Lewis War Memorial Association of Galston and North Galston to create two new memorials costing £50,000. In September a new plaque in memory of WWII 30 Commando Assault Unit casualties was unveiled at Littlehampton war memorial, West Sussex in

the presence of Unit veterans and with a parade led by the Royal Marines band from HMS Nelson.


Portsmouth. A new memorial has been unveiled by HRH the Duke of Edinburgh at Ouistreham, Normandy (Sword Beach) to

War Memorials Restored Refurbishment of the John and Taylor Pits War Memorial, Standish, was completed in October. The memorial takes the form of a stone cairn, 14ft high, built by local colliery workmen adjacent to the Wigan Coal and Iron Company's John and Taylor Pits and unveiled in 1920. The

stones to build the caim came from the tunnels of the John Pit and a bronze plaque recorded the names of the 22 dead. When the colliery closed in 1960 this plaque was moved to Standish Parish Church. It has been replicated as part of the refurbishment work, but the new plaque is being displayed at Shevington



village hall for security reasons, following the theft of new flagstones from the memorial site within 3 days of their being installed. Llangullo Sculptor Jonathan Bower-Protheroe has refurbished the lettering on the Presteigne Cenotaph in Powys, recutting over 1,200 individual letters, to complete a comprehensive package of repair works to the memorial carried out over the last 2 years.

Marple War Memorial Research

Three local fire-fighters have researched the backgrounds of all 141 men commemorated on

the WWI memorial in Marple War Memorial Park, starting with John Collings-Wells who, they noticed, had earned the Victoria Cross. National Inventory of War Memorials Update by Jane Armer and Lorraine Knight

We are nearing the completion date for the data collection stage of the project, and the database will be officially launched on November 8th, 2001. After much hard work we have finally cleared our backlog, some of which dated back to the first days of the project in 1989! We now have no records to catalogue which are more than 18 months old.

As a result, we thought it a good time to reassess where we might need further help, as we now have a much better idea of the sort of records we hold. There are some areas where we felt that the number of records was too low compared with similar areas of the country, and more fieldwork needs to be done.

We need to find and then input the other 10,000 war memorials that we estimate are out there - all by September!


MISSING: Board of Trade War Memorial

The Department of Trade and Industry is appealing for information about memorials to staff from the Board of Trade who fell in both World Wars. The Board's WWI memorial, originally in its London Headquarters, has been missing for many years. It was a bronze plaque, framed in oak and surmounted by a carved galleon's hull, and recorded the names of 305 staff from the Board's offices (which included local labour exchanges) all over the country.

There is no record of an equivalent memorial for WWII, though research has identified at least 5 members of staff who lost their lives.





MISSING: St Mary's Schools War Memorial, North Hyde, Southall

Ross McManus, the father of singer Elvis Costello, is leading a search for the current whereabouts of the war memorial from St Mary's Schools, North Hyde (formerly St Mary's RC Orphanage for Boys). The 14ft tall memorial stood outside the school on Southall Lane and was relocated when the building











was demolished in the 1950's – but records of the move have been lost, along with the memorial. Mr McManus's father attended the school and was wounded fighting in WWI – other former pupils join him in his quest. The Fovant Badges Society

The Fovant Badges are the largest group of hillside chalk figures in the country and can be seen from the A30 road passing through the Dorset village of Fovant. The first badge was cut in 1916 by men of the London Rifle Brigade stationed at Fovant Camp and was soon followed by others.

Those that remain today include, among others, a map of Australia, and the badges of the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry, 6th City of London Regiment, Australian Commonwealth Military Forces, Royal Corps of Signals and the Wiltshire Regiment.

Of the 12 badges that survive, 9 are original to WWI and their maintenance is a huge task – the largest of the badges measures 66 yards from end to end.

The Fovant Badges Society is responsible for the upkeep of the badges – recutting the outlines, removing vegetation, repairing damage and trying to prevent them sliding down the hillside. The Society welcomes new members and contributions, and also offers a range of publications for sale.
