

# Are we protecting our war memorials?



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## Starts

A national campaign has been launched to support the preservation of war memorials and ensure that the names of those who died are remembered by future generations.

War Memorials Trust is calling upon local councils to help communities protect and conserve their war memorials by identifying War Memorials Officers.

Many local authorities do not have a member of staff with clear responsibility for war memorials and members of the public can find it difficult to know who to contact when they see a memorial in need of repair or have a war memorial issue.

War Memorials Trust, an independent charity, is leading the campaign. Its Director, Frances Moreton, said: "We hope that having a named contact in each local council will improve the ways in which war memorials are protected, and help create a strong network to ensure their future preservation across the country. War Memorials Trust will work closely with War Memorials Officers to provide support and advice, sharing our comprehensive information resources."

Local councils are not responsible for all war memorials but often people turn to them in the first instance. War Memorials Trust is therefore encouraging them to take a civic lead, particularly in the run up to the centenary of World War I.

Some councils have already taken this step:

Wirral Borough Council explain why they have a Memorials Officer: "Wirral Council recognises the importance and significance of these war memorials. They are a testament to all the brave that have fallen in various conflicts whilst defending our realm. It is particularly prevalent given the current conflict in Afghanistan. The monuments stand as a source of pride and comfort to many. They also serve as an education element within areas of schools curriculum. It is only right and proper that we seek to maintain and preserve these important structures."

Leicestershire County Council War Memorials Project Co-ordinator, Liz Blood describes her project: "Leicestershire County Council's project is recording and researching memorials with the help of community volunteers, and joins the War Memorials Trust in their calls for greater protection and appropriate conservation. We are offering advice, financial assistance and help in finding specialist contractors to selected projects to serve as examples for others. The depth of local knowledge and warmth of local memory that we are uncovering is astounding, and the archive being produced is a fascinating resource on all aspects of war memorials, from the lives of local casualties, to the 'biographies' of memorials. While many are currently serving in Afghanistan, there is no more crucial time than now to show support for the Armed Forces, and encourage care for war memorials, which are the tangible representation of our history and their memory."
