2021-22 war memorial theft, vandalism and antisocial behaviour cases

War Memorials Trust is pleased to report that levels of theft, vandalism and other forms of anti-social behaviour directed at war memorials remain very low. Just 0.04% of war memorials in the UK are believed to have been subject to such problems.

In 2021-22, incidents of theft and vandalism fell, with just 10 reported compared to 16 in 2020-21. However, reports of anti-social behaviour and graffiti increased from 21 to 31.

Each of these cases has caused upset for individuals and communities. We should all work hard to avoid such events. However, it is important to recognise that they are few and far between reflecting how the estimated 100,000 war memorials across the UK are wonderfully well-cared for by the communities who remain responsible for them.

War Memorials Trust can provide advice, guidance and potentially grant funding, to those impacted by such incidents. Dealing with the results of such attacks inappropriately can cause further damage so the Trust highlights the importance of obtaining professional advice. In 2021-22, the Grants for War Memorials Scheme, supported by Historic England and administered by War Memorials Trust, provided £1,340 to assist a project to reinstate a plaque stolen from <u>Griff Colliery</u> war memorial 16 years ago.

War Memorials Trust's Director, Frances Moreton, said: "War Memorials Trust abhors all acts of damage or disrespect aimed at war memorials. They disrespect those commemorated by our war memorials, the custodians who care for them today and the wider community for whom the war memorial has a central role as a focus for remembrance.

- 1. For details of specific cases of theft and vandalism in each year please see the associated appendix for the relevant News releases or statements. Numbers of reported thefts and vandalism are based on cases reported directly to War Memorials Trust or those that it picks up from various media. There is no obligation for anyone to report theft and vandalism to War Memorials Trust and as such there may be other cases of which the charity is unaware.
- 2. In Memoriam 2014 is a partnership between the SmartWater Foundation and War Memorials Trust. In Memoriam 2014 offers protection for war memorials at risk of theft or damage by enabling communities to mark them with a forensic liquid called SmartWater. The traceable liquid has a unique chemical composition and forensic code that can be applied so if memorials/features are stolen they can be returned to the scene of the crime. It is available free of charge to war memorial custodians. SmartWater is well known to criminals, who acknowledge that it represents a genuine threat to them as the product has had a 100% conviction rate in hundreds of cases. The SmartWater Foundation Ltd is a not-for-profit company established and funded solely by SmartWater Technology Ltd. The Foundation provides charitable donations of equipment and services to the UK law enforcement agencies in support of local crime reduction initiatives within hard-pressed communities.
